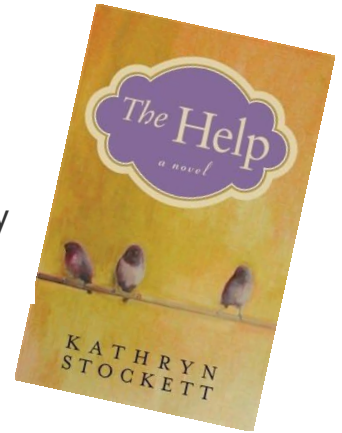


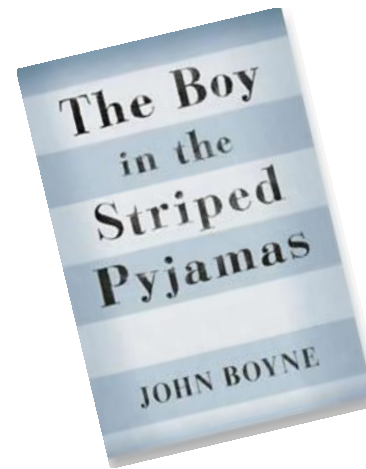

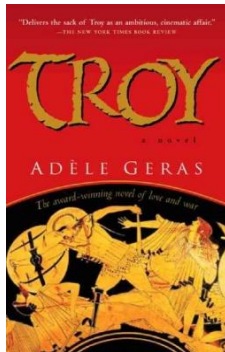
The Help by Kathryn Stockett

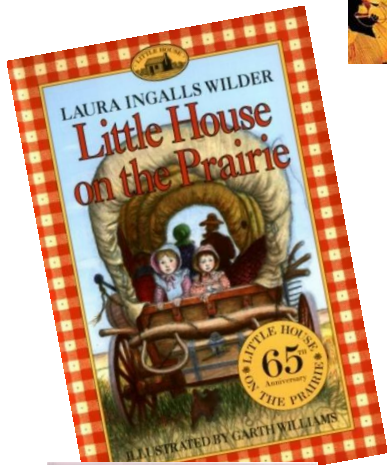
The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas by John Boyne
This book shows the emotions of a young boy observing the actions of the Nazi's, and also embodies his feeling of helplessness as his innocent young friend is persecuted.



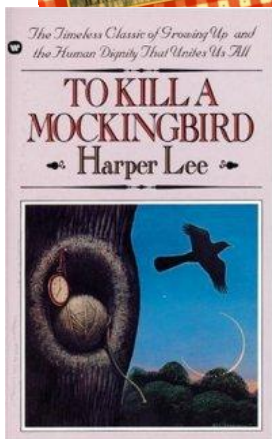
Troy by Adele Geras
